in the midst of persecution. We will look deeper into what it means to be "resurrection people" in the 21st century.

Soul Care Offerings will continue to be developed and launched in early 2025. These include Soul Care digital communities and exploring the options for live workshops to learn about offerings through UWFaith Digital.

INFLUENCE:

Leadership Development Days will support leaders to take their skills to the next level. Save the days: November 21-23, 2024. This is a wonderful resource for all conference leadership serving in 2025, and there will also be limited availability for two district leadership persons to attend. Registration opens in September. I wanted to include this information to all readers of this Sharing Line as we are influenced by the amazing opportunities provided to leaders at all levels. These excellent growth opportunities would not exist without the generous commitment of our pledge dollars!

IMPACT:

Our Social Justice Priorities for 2024-2028 are now announced. Both Social Justice Priorities of "Climate Justice" and "Mass Incarceration and Criminalization of Communities of Color" will continue. There is still much work to be done, and these significantly impact the lives of women, children, and youth, and our voices as United Women in Faith need to be heard! Let us also remember to celebrate the work you have done in these areas during the last quadrennium and the additional priorities we have supported in Maternal Health and Food Insecurity

VOTE—Put your FAITH into ACTION; this is one of our main opportunities to let our voices be heard boldly as United Women in Faith.

The 2025 United Women in Faith Reading Program will be released in late August/ early September. Did you know over 400 people volunteered to be Reading Program evaluators in 2024? (I volunteered to evaluate children's and youth books for the reading program for several years. It was amazing.)

Here are a few numbers that you will find exciting...As of July 2024, the total raised to support the continued work of United Women in Faith through the Legacy Endowment Fund is \$38,773,749! The total raised on the Day of Giving 2024 was \$424,415.00! We can celebrate this as we share with a grateful heart with our sisters nationally! Together, we are stronger.



ANNUAL CONFERENCE 2024 UPDATE

Creation Justice Task Force Co-Chair, Rev. Paul Mitchell, said he is bringing living water! Thirty-five percent of churches have committees addressing Creation Care and Justice, a majority are making changes, and 25 percent are willing to start green practices such as adding solar panels. Eighty percent identified a need for more funding to do these things. The Commission is supporting local churches in finding grants to do this work. The presentation concluded with representatives lifting "wash tubs" labeled Clergy, Laity, Funders, Staff, and You. "We need each one of you to carry water any way you know how. To thrive will require the involvement of all."

Focus group recommendations were approved later in the afternoon, including closing three churches-Lapwai, Nezperce, and Bellevue Korean. In a diversion from the usual procedure, no budget was presented for approval, but table talks took place over three days to gather everyone's budget priorities. Then, with other input, a budget will be presented at a special Annual Conference session in Novemberprobably by Zoom. No date was given. We were asked what help we in local churches want from the Annual Conference and how we would like to receive it.

At a district meeting after dinner, we stood up by clusters—us in Vancouver, but Grays River was not mentioned! I collected certificates for payment of 100% of apportionments for both churches. We did not introduce ourselves by name, but Keith spoke about lay-led churches needing technical assistance in addition to preachers not as much at Fern Prairie, but definitely at Grays River.

On Saturday, we began with a camping song about a moose and another budget table discussion about which ministries we would like to see working together and how much we would help. There was also a community color run for children, during which colored foam was sprayed on them.

I talked at a Mission u table at the ministry fair when 20+ tables were displayed in the gym with United Women in Faith, Global Ministries, Camping, Disaster Relief, etc. I chatted with many people as they wandered around, and I collected different flyers and pens.

Petition #13 concerning establishing healthy working standards of 35-40 hours a week for pastoral leaders was adopted. Pastors are adaptive leaders in a changing culture. "We need support; we need the conversation to know we are not alone."

I did show photos and programs about the Pageant to many people and had the promise of a photo of Rev. JD Stout from his granddaughter. He filled in for Dorothy Northcutt when she went on a world cruise around 1964. His son, Rev. J Dean Stout, served Camas then. I gave a program to the bishop, so when the reading of appointments came later in the afternoon, the bishop mentioned our 150th! This was the only special mention of all the appointments!

The Annual Conference concluded with the ordination service at ten, which lasted two hours but was the usual impressive ritual. A brass band accompanied the singing of "Praise to the Lord, The Almighty" and "Joyful, Joyful, We Adore You," and others.

Afterward, we drove home, taking Deb Avery along the 'Road less traveled," which Keith may not choose to take again. It avoided the freeway on the Oregon side, going the most direct route through Prosser-where we witnessed a church baptism in the Yakima River, 'Heaven' as in Horse Heaven Hills, seeing a coyote, a groundhog, deer, cattle and horses, a farm dog chasing us at 26 mph for several hundred yards, gravel roads aplenty, bumpy steep slopes, fantastic views and no traffic at all. We went through Bickleton, Goldendale, where we missed a Dairy Queen, Centerville, and Lyle, where there were bathrooms! The car was so dusty that we took photos. We eventually dropped Deb off at her home and arrived at our home for a most welcome cup of tea. Have you ever been on the Bickleton and Centerville highways? We will not forget them nor the 'Well' Conference that preceded.

MORE FROM THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE 2024

The PNW Annual Conference was held in Richland, WA, at Central United Protestant Church. When the Manhattan Project began, many people went to Richland, and RC and Protestant churches were built. The Protestant one had 11 services on Sundays! Eventually, the building was Methodist, and a new building in 1964 was constructed. It is large, with a sanctuary and fellowship hall holding at least 300 around round tables. The church's basement has a full-size gym that can be entered directly from the back as the church is built on a slope.

To our knowledge, this is the first time that the Annual Conference has been held in a church; last year's was at the University of Puget Sound and previously at Puyallup Fairgrounds or convention centers in recent years. The church was welcoming, and contracted caterers served us three dinners and two lunches from the narthex, which we ate in the fellowship hall. The food was good, but there were no desserts! We had breakfast in the hotel.

The Samaritan woman at the well was the annual conference theme, "Being Well." This theme was used for all the worship services and interpreted by the preachers in different ways. Here is

the logo, which is especially appropriate for Fern Prairie as we have a well. I did not find any other churches with a well,



so I told people about ours—240 feet deep for the 240 years of American Methodism.

We began at two pm on Thursday, June 13, after our almost four-hour ride along the Washington side of the Columbia. At opening worship, we sang the hymn "Are We Yet Alive?" the bishop preached for 33 minutes, followed by lay and clergy sessions. The laity session elected a new lay leader for the Quadrennium—Felisha Hola, a 24-year-old Tongan woman who has attended the Annual Conference since she was 13 and has just completed a degree in Political Science at Rochester. "I've always been passionate about advocacy and representation because many of the spaces I've been in, even in our own conference, are places I've been the only young person or Pasifika woman in the room. At times, I felt uncomfortable and a sense of imposter syndrome, but I learned how important it was to be in these spaces."

Two hundred fifty people had registered in person and about the same number to attend online, but votes only totaled around 250 throughout the session.

The Memorial Service on Thursday night remembered ten bishops who had died since last year, including Mel Talbert and Cal McConnell, both of whom served PNW, as well as Ruth Mathis and other clergy.

Friday began with a plenary and the retirement celebration, but only five retirees were in person at Richland.

Friday afternoon was the report of the General Conference Delegation, held in

Charlotte, North Carolina, earlier this year. Only 765 of the 862 attendees were there due to different issuesvisas and communication—and these delegates were elected eight years ago. No GC in 2020 due to covid. One thousand ninety-nine petitions were dealt with in 14 committees and translated into four official languages for printing, but ten were used. The three R's were the focus of GC, and all were approved by larger margins than expected-pass revised Social Principles, address Regionalization, and remove harmful language in The Book of Discipline. A move toward regionalization began. Brant Henshaw said regionalization requires modification to the church constitution, with a two-thirds approval vote from every global member worldwide. Regionalization would allow each region, like the US, Africa, or the Philippines, to vote on issues pertaining solely to it.

Some other highlights were an apology to Hawaiians for the Methodist' role in overthrowing their monarchy, a smaller budget, 32 bishops for the US with five for the Western Jurisdiction, and full communion with the Episcopal church. Due to Minerva Carcano and Karen Oliveto retiring, two new bishops will be needed for our Western Jurisdiction. However, we will probably get two from other jurisdictions—this is not yet final. No nominations for bishop were received, though the Jurisdictional Meeting in July will take place at Spokane Valley UMC.

HOW TO BECOME A CHARTER FOR RACIAL JUSTICE CLUB



For a local unit to become a Charter for Racial Justice Club member, the unit must carry out one

activity from each section during a calendar year. After that, the unit must complete one activity annually. If membership lapses, the unit must begin again with three activities.

Local units will work with a report to their District Mission coordinator for Social Action. The Racial Justice Committee will meet to consider the revisions of criteria annually.

Units will be recognized for becoming a Charter for Racial Justice Club.

Annually, every Charter for Racial Justice Club Unit must read and review the Racial Justice Charter. This will be found on the website of pnwumc.org/uwfaith/resources/ racial-justice, printable or downloadable.

The Pacific Northwest Conference United Women in Faith Charter for Racial Justice Committee has worked to create new and universal (2018) criteria for the CRJ Club that will make participation both more accessible and more meaningful.

Purpose

The organized unit of **United Women in Faith** shall be a community of women whose **PURPOSE** is to know God and to experience freedom as whole persons through Jesus Christ, to develop a creative, supportive fellowship, and to expand concepts of mission through participation in the global ministries of the church.

The United Women in Faith adopted the Charter for Racial Justice (CRJ) in 1978. The CRJ was adopted by the whole United Methodist Church in 1980.

OPTIONS FOR FULFILLMENT

UNIT PROGRAMMING

From Tools for Leaders: Resources for Racial Justice, complete one Bible study, workshop, or worship service included within the Charter.

- In your unit or a small group, study the portion of the Racial Justice Timeline that spans your lifetime. Make written reflections and share them with other group members.
- Share (both positive and negative) local newspaper articles, United Women in Faith reading program books, and documentaries relating to racism. Forward the information shared with a short report to your District Mission Coordinator for Social Action. We may use them for display at either Mission U or the United Women in Faith Conference Annual Meeting
- Hold a letter-writing or postcardwriting correspondence party supporting or lobbying for racial justice legislation or policy.

UNIT ENRICHMENT

- As a unit, attend a worship service of a church, synagogue, or temple with a majority ethnic background different from your own. Be certain to inform the leadership of your intended visit.
- Watch a documentary or read a book containing racial justice themes with your unit, circle,

or church small group. Discuss the movie using these three questions: Who is being exploited? Who benefits from the exploitation? What are we going to do about it?

- Have a member of your unit sign up to receive free email updates from:
 - The Sentencing Project, sentencingproject.org
 - Colorlines, colorlines.com
 - Equal Justice Initiative, eji.org.
- Be creative, and develop a Racial Justice learning experience for your unit or church.
- Present a program on equal education, housing, employment, or medical care exploring how race may have been a factor or implicated in the area.
- Plan jointly with a group of different racial/ethnic backgrounds:
- Programs from the United Women in Faith Program Resource Book at one or more meetings.
- Book reviews using books from the Reading Program with special emphasis on books related to minority groups and persons.
- Study groups using one of the current (racial justice) study themes.
- Ecumenical resources on social justice.

BEYOND THE LOCAL UNIT

- Host an international tasting party, cultural fair, or other event. Be certain to integrate a racial justice element into the programming.
- As a unit or with the church, sponsor a refugee family.
- For one month, scan the daily news media (TV/ newspaper, advertising, pictures, and/or children's literature) to ascertain the degree of ethnic/racial/ minority stereotyping portrayed.
- Use the information in one of the following ways:
- Design and present unit programs.
- Share information with the administrative body of your church.
- Share with Sunday School classes.
- Share with a youth group.
- Publish results of a survey in local church news media.

Inspire every member of United Methodist Women to make a gift to the Legacy Fund of **at least \$18.69 per year** or month over and above her Pledge to mission for five years.

PICK YOUR PASSION AND TAKE ACTION!

United Women in Faith sisters,

Recently, at the conference United Women in Faith executive meeting, women were asked to think about ways they describe themselves. There was an opportunity to acknowledge if they had ever fit into a specific category. These included being the class clown, never being on time, being a caregiver, overcoming a challenge, being a teacher, etc. We have all had various experiences that make us who we are. It is those opportunities that help us grow and learn. I imagine you are familiar with "thinking outside the box." Sometimes, that different idea is the voice we need to hear. At the end of the activity, those present were given a sticky note and asked to think outside the box about what being part of United Women in Faith means and what United Women in Faith needs to do to meet the needs of new members.

I was slightly disappointed when I only got five responses from approximately seventeen people.

I WANT TO SHARE THE IDEAS WE RECEIVED WITH YOU.

• Have a letter-writing (postcard) table at events, re: legislative issues.

We could easily set this up at the annual gathering or district meetings. A program could also be implemented at the local unit to share concerns and issues that will be brought to the legislature. This could be done as a team effort with the coordinator for social justice and interested members. I have done this type of campaign as a member of the teachers' union.

• Organize (another) seminar at the General Board of Church and Society

I am not sure what this participant wants to hear about. This could cover a variety of topics. The United Women in Faith website has multiple choices for speakers and workshops. If you have not had the chance to look at these opportunities, I encourage you to do so. The website is **umwmissionresources.org.** You can also find information on the conference website at **pnwumc.org/uwfaith**

• BEING LESS POLITICAL would be good. (the capital letters were written by the participant)

I would like to have a conversation with the writer of this comment. I want to know what her thoughts and concerns are. The only way to address concerns is to openly and honestly discuss the topic. Everyone is entitled to their opinion. I agree that some political topics need to stay out of the church. Some issues that are important to some members may not be an area of interest to others. This is why there can be multiple areas, and individuals can participate in the ones they are passionate about.

• Have officers visit local meetings to "listen."

I believe this is being done in some districts. That's not to say we can't do more. I know one MNO coordinator who is calling all the units in her district. Another MNO coordinator is visiting with other officers/members. Individual units could coordinate meetings with several other units. This could be for fellowship as well as information gathering.

• Training for newbies: "United Women in Faith 101".

It can seem overwhelming to jump right in and get your feet wet. There is no wrong way to participate. That said, it is helpful to have an understanding of your role. If individuals need information, there are seminars on the national website, and local officers/members can assist you. I, for one, can get frustrated with figuring out some of the technical opportunities for training. Ask a friend. Attend an online program in a group in case there are technical difficulties. Call another member. District and conference officers are here for you. Please take advantage of their knowledge. Do not be afraid to ask. I, for one, will tell you if I do not know the answer. I will also help you seek out the information you need.

REGIONALIZATION: EFFECTIVE MINISTRY IN EVERY CULTURE

Regionalization allows United Methodists throughout our connection to best serve their unique communities as they share the love of God, make disciples and transform the world.



WHAT IS REGIONALIZATION?

- Regionalization allows each region of the church to make decisions that will best support outreach and ministry efforts in their specific setting. This ability is already in place in the central conferences; regionalization will bring that ability to the U.S. as well.
- Regionalization was developed collaboratively by United Methodists across the globe.
- It was adopted by an overwhelming majority of General Conference delegates.
- Nine regional conferences will comprise The UMC: one in the U.S. and eight in Africa, Europe and the Philippines.

WHAT CAN'T Regional conferences do?

- Create their own constitution or adopt any policy in violation of the constitution contained in the General Book of Discipline
- Alter The Doctrinal Standards, Our Theological Task, The Ministry of All Christians or The Social Principles

WHAT CAN Regional conferences do?

- Draft and publish their own regional Book of Discipline, hymnals, books of worship and other liturgical recources
- Set requirements for ordination and licensed ministry with respect to their needs and resources
- · Set standards for lay membership
- Develop practices around marriage ceremonies, funerals and other rites that align with cultural contexts and laws in each country
- Reorganize their annual conferences, districts or charge conferences to best serve their missional needs and convene their own judicial courts
- Work with annual conferences to ensure policies and practices align with the laws in each country





WHAT NOW?

- The regionalization plan will require amending the United Methodist Constitution. Constitutional amendments
 must be passed by at least 2/3 of General Conference, which already happened.
- Now, the amendments must be ratified by annual conferences. Amendments must be supported by 2/3
 of the total voting members of all the annual conferences combined this process could last until 2026.
- The Council of Bishops will announce when the amendments have met the threshold to become church law.

"Regionalization is a pathway to make manifest the world-wide nature of The United Methodist Church. It will expand the Church's witness, embrace the cultural diversity, strengthen the connection and empower each missional context."


